

REGINA'S ECONOMIC BRIEFING

Stable and modest growth

The Greater Regina Area (GRA) saw a slight slowdown in the rate of employment growth in March (0.4%) compared to February (0.5%). March job growth is predominantly full-time, and unemployment remains low at 5%. A strong surge in January building permits, a leading indicator of construction activity, was not matched in February, although housing starts remain solid. March also saw a small increase in the labour force population and a modest downtick in the rate of inflation – both positive stories.

Increasing employment

Average year-to-date total employment in the Greater Regina Region was up 0.4% or 500 positions in March 2023 over the same period in 2022.

Growth in housing starts

Counter to national trends, February year-to-date housing starts are up by 119 units or 122.7% over the same period in 2022.

February 2023 year to date building permits are up 20.4% over the same period in 2022.

Labour force

The number of those of labour force age but not in the labour force decreased by 100 over the same time period as employment growth continued.

Interest rate relief

A sign of relief for Canadians with variable mortgage rates as the Bank of Canada held its overnight rate at 4.5%. The CPI dropped to 4.3% in March and the Bank expects it to reach its 2% target by the end of 2024.

Interest costs impacting housing prices

Reflecting higher borrowing costs, the average year-to-date Housing Price Index Benchmark Composite Price is down from \$317,700 in March 2022 to \$309,833 in March 2023.

Amid slowing non-residential building permit data, year-to-date March 2023 construction employment was down slightly (-200) from the same period in 2022.






Air travel through YQR is taking off

- Regina International Airport (YQR) expects rebound to 93% of pre-pandemic capacity over June/July/August 2023
- WestJet's summer 2023 capacity through YQR is up 8,000 seats over 2019, while Air Canada is up 2,800 seats
- Passenger travel increased by 115% from 2021 to 2022. (355,490 passengers to 764,128)
- International travel increased by 17,576 people from 2021 to 2022
- Total domestic travel increased by 108% from 353,445 passengers in 2021 to 735,055 in 2022
- So far in 2023, there have been 18,913 international air passengers through YQR (9% of total passenger travel)
- So far in 2023, 15,791 air pasengers have traveled to the US through YQR
