

## **REGINA'S ECONOMIC BRIEFING**

### **Employment Rate Bounces Back**

The Greater Regina Area (GRA) employment rate increased by 1.1% in April 2023 relative to the same time last year. This growth is driven by full-time employment. With unemployment still low at 5%, Regina appears to be approaching full employment. Despite softening building permit data, housing starts remain buoyant, driven by apartment/condo permits.

#### Solid GDP growth

Regina's real GDP surpassed its prepandemic level, set in the fourth quarter of 2019, in last year's second quarter. The city's real GDP for 2022 was \$17 billion, an increase of 3.1 per cent, the fastest growth rate since 2014.

#### Population Increase

Regina's population rose by 1.7 per cent in 2022, the fastest pace since 2018. Net international migration hit a record high of 6,470 people last year, more than twice the 20-year average.

### **Growth in housing starts**

Fueled by a surge in apartment/condo units, April 2023 saw an increase of 127 units (77.4%) increase in total year-to-date housing starts.

### Inflation slowing down

Canada's annual inflation rate declined from 5.2% in February 2023 to 4.3% in March 2023. Regina's March inflation rate was 5.1%.

## Addressing the labour shortage

The Government of Saskatchewan has announced \$1.92M in funding to Regina and Saskatoon Trades and Skills Centres. The funding is expected to help grow the provincial labour force and address Saskatchewan's labour shortage.

## Interest costs impacting house prices

With higher lending rates impacting purchasing power, Regina's average year-to-date Housing Price Index Benchmark Composite Price has decreased from \$319,800 in April 2022 to \$310,175 in April 2023.

#### A central peice of Regina's economy

- Spring is a crucial season for farmers in Saskatchewan and across Canada. Saskatchewan's annual spring seeding "megaproject" generates massive economic activity for the agriculture industry and provincial economy.
- EDR's report, titled <u>Saskatchewan's Annual Megaproject: Spring</u> <u>Seeding</u>, uses data from a range of sources to understand the impact of this investment.
- All told, Saskatchewan producers will invest more than \$11B to get their 2023 spring crops into the ground, including:






