

REGINA'S ECONOMIC BRIEFING

Bright spots & challenges

Not surprisingly, Regina's economy, while impacted by global conditions, continues to fare relatively well. Average year-to-date (YTD) total employment remains ahead of a year ago. Unemployment remains low, and housing starts and residential building permits continue to surge. However, high inflation and rising lending rates will likely act as a drag on future growth.

Employment continues to climb

Average YTD total employment in the Greater Regina Area was up 2.2% or 2,970 positions in September 2022 over the same period in 2021.

Building permits up overall, but varied

September 2022 YTD building permits are up 4.4% over 2021, with year-overyear increases in residential (17.0%) and commercial (31.1%). Industrial (-50.2%), institutional and governmental (-56.0%) posted declines.

Tighter housing inventories

Regina is experiencing below average housing inventories, specifically in homes priced under \$500,000.


Interest Rates continue to climb

On October 26, the Bank of Canada raised its benchmark interest rate by 50 basis points to 3.75%. The benchmark interest rate has increased six times since March in a bid to combat inflation, which sits at 6.9% nationally.

Solid GDP growth

The Conference Board of Canada expects Regina's real GDP to grow by 6.1% in 2022 and a further 3.3% in 2023.

A DEEPER LOOK...

Affordability Cheque Impact

The Government of Saskatchewan is issuing a \$500 Saskatchewan Affordability Tax Credit (SATC) cheque to residents over the age of 18, including more than 217,00 residents in the Greater Regina Agrea (GRA). Altering the disposable income of households affects their consumption levels, increasing the output of the economy. The SATC increases government transfers by approximately \$109M.

To calculate the impact of the cheque, the Marginal Propensity to Consume (MPC) and a multiplier need to be determined. MPC is the proportion of an increase in income that gets spent on consumption. For example: if we have an MPC of 0.5, that means for every 1 dollar, 50 cents gets spent on consumption and 50 cents is saved. Regina's MPC is unavailable, so a stress test using a range of different MPCs is used to estimate the range of the economic impact.

Here's what that looks like for Regina:

The economic impact of the SATC ranges from around \$72M to \$163M, depending on consumer behaviour - whether they save or spend. Due to inflation rates increasing at a rapid pace, a rational assumption would be that the ratio between consumption and savings would be close. Labour force and unemployment

Regina's October 2022 unemployment rate is 5.1%, down from 7.3% a year earlier. In that time, the average number of unemployed decreased by 3,140 to 7,620.


